IMPORTANT NOTICE

This information is for anyone who is overdue in rent, loans, family maintenance or any other monies owed to OIB's companies

- 1. If you are eligible to receive a distribution from OIB and your rent arrears or monies owed to any of OIB companies or Family maintenance are over \$5,000 your entire distribution will be put toward your debt to OIB, it's companies or Family Maintenance. All your children's monies will go into their Trust account **but** if you are on an active repayment agreement and you have not missed any payments since the day you signed your agreement, you will receive ½ of your child/children's distribution.
- 2. If you are on an active repayment agreement and have not missed any payments since January 2023 you will only receive ½ of your distribution and ½ of your child/children's distribution. Your deducted portion will be put toward your debt to OIB.
- **3.** Members on Social Assistance who have rental arrears will be treated the same as all member of the OIB, the same rules must apply to all.
- **4.** ½ of all minor's distribution is put into their trust fund/account.
- **5.** The following will apply to Band Member parents who dispute their children's distribution:
 - If the child/children are not in custody of either parent all distribution will be put into their trust fund.
 - If the Mother/Father has custody of the child/children (proof needs to be provided) and is not a band member and the Band Member parent can provide proof that he/she is paying support he/she has the option of allowing the non Band Member parent to have the minor's share of the distribution or the full amount can be put into the minor's trust account. If the Band Member parent (who does not have custody) is not paying child support, he/she will have no say as to what happens to the minor's distribution portion.

As of October 15, 2023, OIB Housing has a total of \$123,824.91 owing in rent arrears. There are 48 active renters and 20 of them are in arrears.

Dear Members,

Effective in 2016, the Annual Distribution to Band Members will be:

- 1) 10% of gross lease revenues;
- 2) 10% of the Operating income of the OIBDC businesses, including investments in other partnerships;
- 3) 50% of the estimated Profit Share

This year we are reporting our results to include all the companies that are under the OIBDC portfolio to improve our accountability and transparency to you, the members of the Osoyoos Indian Band. This new reporting method includes the overall results of the companies regardless if that company made a profit or a loss, and this amount is consolidated to give a clear indication on how the companies did overall. **The total allowance is** $\frac{$2,345.00}{}$

Our land leases continue to be OIB's major source of income. That is why leases are so important, and in the future as more business leases are done at the Senkulmen Business Park, the Band will receive more direct income. Remember, Band businesses will have ups and downs and a majority of their income, (where there is a profit), must be kept to not only pay back past losses and debt but also a majority of the profit must be retained to operate in future years.

As usual the Youth (18 and under) will have half of their distribution deposited into their Trust account until they turn 19 years of age so they can benefit from the monies when they are older. Parents have to realize the long term benefits of having 1/2 of the Christmas allowance set aside into the minor trust account for their kids.

<u>*For members who owe the band money (rent, loan, store account, daycare etc.) will have the money</u> owed deducted from their allowance and directed to their debt.*

An important fact to remember and plan for is the yearly increases in Band membership. This year our membership is now at 589 members up from 580 last year, 9 new members. With more people comes more costs and increased responsibility.

On behalf of the Chief and Council, I wish everyone a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.



Monthly Safety Tip – Pedestrian Safety					

With the changing weather and reduced number of daylight hours, the concern for pedestrian safety increases. The following are some recommended safety tips from the Oliver RCMP:

For Drivers:

- When approaching an intersection or crosswalk, watch for pedestrians
- Watch for vehicles stopped or slowing in the lane next to yours, they may be yielding to a pedestrian
- Stay alert and slow down on residential streets/school/playground zones
- Failing to yield to a pedestrian can carry multiple fines which also have driver penalty points





For Pedestrians:

- Always use crosswalks and pedestrian-activated signals when available
- Don't jaywalk, drivers are not anticipating pedestrians crossing in the middle of the street
- Make eye contact with drivers before you cross the street
- Walk on the sidewalk if available or walk off the roadway if not
- Pay attention! Remove headphones; put away cell phones or other devices when crossing the street
