





Osoyoos Band Members

Vote on March 28th 2024 for the Re-Designation of Tuc el Nuit Lands for future development.

"Vote YES on March 28th 2024 for the Designation of Tuc el Nuit lands:" Voting open from 9:00 AM to 8:00 PM at the Hall



- The land has been leased out and developed before (previously designated twice, first in the 1960s) and the land was designated again in 2009 for 110 years for residential leasing purposes
- This area was formerly developed in the 1970s (Cherry Grove Hotel / Trailer Park & Poznikoff House) which later became a daycare but was subsequently demolished.
- OIB is currently dealing with invasive weeds and ongoing transient campers / trespassers in the area.
- Lot 237 is proposed to be developed with 88 townhomes on 6.7 acres of land (the "First Project").
- Land lease designations over 100 years is normal PIB designated the Skaha Hills Development, above the airport for 150 years (this does not mean the land is lease out for that term. The actual leases are 99 years.) Westbank does 125 year designation.

PROJECT BENEFITS

- ✓ Prepaid lease payments of \$5.5 million for Lot 237.
- ✓ Proposed development cost charges of \$2.6 million for Lot 237 to the Band.
- ✓ Expected annual property taxes of \$400,000 from the First Project to the Band once fully developed, based on 88 units (+/- \$4,500/unit) at an average value of \$1M/unit.
- ✓ Up to 100 construction jobs created during the development (site manager, foreman, carpenters, health safety officers, skilled labors paying \$25 to \$50/hr) which will likely take 5 7 years to build out, which will support the local businesses, and will be available to Band members first.
- ✓ \$500,000 of revenue for the Band owned Oliver Readi Mix, for over 150-200 truck loads of cement, as well as excavator and dump truck business for the project's land preparation
- ✓ Additional revenues of \$132,000/ year (\$1,500 per unit) for the operation of the Band's owned Nk'Mip Utility Ltd.
- ✓ Significant investment in infrastructure around Tuc el Nuit lake to improve the services for the area, including Senkulmen Industrial Park and will help generate more economic development opportunities.
- ✓ The Canyon Desert Golf Course currently owes \$3M to the Band. The additional homes will bring in more golfers and customers to generate more revenue for the Course, the restaurant and the pro shop.
- ✓ Beautification around Tuc el Nuit Lake highlighting the Osoyoos Band's pride in its land.

MINOR TRUST DISTRIBUTION 2024

Osoyoos Indian Band, Chief and Council, has been in consultation with OIB's Lawyers, regarding, Per-Capita Distribution for registered OIB members who are MINORS (18 and younger).

- 1. Chief and Council has decided (with legal advice), that it is in the best interest of all OIB Member Minor's, to place 100% of the Minors share of Distributions, Per Capita's into their Minors Trust Fund, which is what most Bands do.
- 2. The Council is giving all OIB parents/Guardians a ten (10) month notice, that starting December 2024, in the best interest of each OIB member Minor that OIB will place 100% of each child's portion in their Minor's Trust Account.
- 3. All Parents and Guardians will still be able to request a form (approved by Council) to withdraw funds, but, for specific purposes and limits only by doing the following.

Filling out an Application, fully and completely and handing it to any Council member or Joanne McGinnis (accounting department). All withdrawal applications, will be presented and approved at a regular Council Meeting.

The reasons for parents and guardians to request monies from the member child Trust Account, will be limited to Education, Medical and Sports.

If payments are approved, they will be paid directly to the provider of the service.



INTRODUCTION

Through an open bid process Parks Canada selected the Osoyoos Indian Band to undertake a Roads Analysis within the proposed national park reserve in the South Okanagan-Similkameen. The Osoyoos Indian Band is working alongside Forsite to complete inventory and analysis work.

This is a preliminary information-gathering exercise. There will not be any road or trail construction, maintenance, decommissioning or enforcement actions associated with this work.

Field visits, inventory work, analysis, cultural and ecological knowledge collection will be completed collaboratively with the Osoyoos Indian Band (OIB) and the Lower Similkameen Indian Band (LSIB).




